## Sanctity of Life Sunday - Prayer of Lament

- Reader#1: God of heaven and earth, you create every human life in your image. You knit us with care and sustain us each day. You shower us with gifts and look on us with pride. You alone are the source of every good thing. You are our strength, our courage, and our hope.
- Reader #2: Lord, we lament for a world that does not recognize the value of every life, whether born or preborn. We cry out to you on behalf of the lives lost each day through abortion. We grieve with those who grieve the loss of children and grandchildren, nieces and nephews.
- Reader #1: Lord, we lift up in prayer to you those who need you most: For those, even Christians, who believe the lie of culture that life is only as valuable as its capabilities or resources, we ask for you to soften hearts and reveal your truth.

- Reader #2: For the many, many women who want to keep their unborn children but cannot see any possible options for doing so, we pray for support, encouragement, and for sisters and brothers in Christ to rise up and meet their needs.
- Reader #1: For women told lies about the impact that choosing abortion will have, and for women who are told they have no choice, Lord, we ask for clarity and courage.
- Reader #2: For men who will never know or hold their child, and are left to wonder "what if," we pray for comfort and strength.
- Reader #1: For women whose bodies have been damaged, some even to the point of death, by an abortion, Lord, we pray for healing.
- Reader #2: For countries where policies restrict the number of children that can be born or devalue the lives of women to the point that abortion is forced upon them, particularly when they are carrying a daughter, we pray for your hand to move to change unjust laws, to protect women at risk, and to raise up a generation that will call on your name. Surely, your arm is not too short to save!
- Reader #1: Lord, forgive us for being parts of nations whose policies promote access to abortion more readily than access to food for children living in poverty. Open our eyes to recognize your face in the most vulnerable and to offer the gifts you have freely given us to them with ready and generous hearts.
- Reader #2: Mighty God, we cling to your promises for justice to be fulfilled, for your grace to be made known, and for your peace to rule in hearts and minds and lives.

Reader #1: Help us to live out the vision you have given us for life in this world. Give us the will and the courage to put the lives of others before our own and to advocate on their behalf, to sacrifice where necessary and to serve where needed. Amen.

#### Dear Friends,


I suspect that when most of us first attempted to read the Song of Songs one of our initial reactions was, "What in the world is **this** doing in the Bible!?" No doubt a second common question was "What on earth is this about!?" When it comes to reading this particular book of the Bible most of us can probably identify with the confusion of the Ethiopian eunuch when Paul asks him, "Do you understand what you are reading?" (Acts 8:30).

Yet, in a world that often both worships sex and also treats it as something dirty – the Song of Songs provides a much needed corrective. It seems to communicate that passionate physical love is a beautiful gift from God. Not only does it demonstrate that the Bible is not 'anti-sex,' but it also demonstrates that biblical sex is to be celebrated with gratitude to God who made us in His image.

In short, the Song of Songs is not only a beautiful love poem, but also a parable about human love that invites us to also reflect deeply on the relationship between Christ and His followers. In other words, it gives us the opportunity to reflect on our own intimate relationship with Jesus. And therefore, certainly one practical question we should keep in front of us throughout the weeks ahead is simply this: "Are we striving to love the Lover of our soul (Jesus) with the same kind of eagerness, anticipation, and passion as we see expressed here in the Song of Songs?" # **OTHER REQUESTS:** (CRC Communications)

January 17, 2021 - (Office of Social Justice: Sanctity of Human Life Sunday) Abortion has disproportionately affected communities of color. In the United States today, a black child is three times more likely to be aborted than a white child. For women of color in Canada and the U.S., being pregnant and giving birth brings a higher risk of death from complications than for white women in these countries. Pray for the safety and protection of women and children who are vulnerable to abortion, and of those who face risks during pregnancy and childbirth, particularly people of color.

January 16, 2021 - (ReFrame Ministries: Church Juice) Pray for the mental health of people who are feeling especially anxious during the winter months of an already stressful year. Pray specifically for Anne, who recently sent a request to our Church Juice team: "Help me pray that I do not succumb to anxiety and depression."

January 14, 2021 - (World Renew: Zambia) The economy of Zambia is still struggling to recover to pre-pandemic levels. The swarm of African migratory locusts in the western province is also still an issue, despite some action by the government. Pray for plentiful rains this month so that this year may see a good harvest and better food security for people living in rural areas.

January 13, 2021 - (Resonate Global Mission: North America) Pray for university students serving as student leaders within Resonate-partner campus ministries in Canada and the United States. Give thanks for the gifts and skills they bring to leadership, and ask God to guide them as they build relationships with students and support their communities.

**2021 Synod - Human Sexuality Report:** Due to the rapidly changing sexual mores within our culture today – the 2016 Synod (the annual general assembly of the Christian Reformed Church) commissioned a study committee to articulate a "Biblical Theology of Human Sexuality" to be used as guidance for churches in our denomination. Five years later (not so 'rapid') this report is completed and will be presented at the 2021 Synod. Recently the elders have been reviewing this report and for the most part have been encouraged by the tenor and wisdom of the report itself. It's also one of the main reasons for our current sermon series on the Song of Songs.
